A new shared understanding of family violence with an Aboriginal cultural lens

The MARAM¹ has a new, extensive definition of family violence. This means all workers can now "speak the same language", be part of a more consistent approach to assessing and managing risk and help to keep people using violence in view and accountable. The definition now includes:

• A shared understanding of family violence in relation to Aboriginal² people:

"In an Aboriginal community context family violence includes a wide range of physical, emotional, sexual, social, spiritual, cultural and economic abuses that can occur within families, extended families, kinship networks and communities. It extends to one-on-one fighting, abuse of Indigenous community workers as well as self-harm, injury and suicide. "

• Expanded understanding and recognition of the effects of family violence on children:

"Behaviour by any person that causes a child to hear or witness or otherwise be exposed to the effects of the above behaviour"

• Family also includes family of choice for many victim survivors of family violence, LGBTISBQA² community members and members of the Stolen Generations.
